OLD BUSINESS

MDA update - Dick Bean

Plum Pox Virus (PPV)

- collected just under 8000 samples in Maryland, all negative.
- only occurs in Adams and Cumberland Counties, PA.
- continue MD statewide survey in 2002.
- if PPV was to be found in Gettysburg peach trees, they would be destroyed.
- aphid transmission of PPV- 15 minute window of opportunity.

Red Imported Fire Ant (RIFA)

• infestation in Bowie - planted with material from quarantine area in South; MD samples all negative outside of infested area.

Daylily rust

• detected in Maryland, brought in from quarantine area in South; all plants confiscated

destroyed and treated with fungicide - detected again, repeated treatment.

Anne Hairston-Strang

FS grants, Alliance for the Chesapeake Bay - Managing Invasive Species in Woodlands.

- Citizens Guide to the Control of Invasive Plants in Wetland and Riparian Ecosystems In the Chesapeake Bay Region - ABSTRACT: The Alliance for the Chesapeake Bay (ACB) wishes to produce a case-study oriented, user-friendly guide that educates watershed organizations, sportsmen groups, landowners, local government and others on the threat posed by exotic invasive plants and identifies appropriate methods to control or eradicate such species. The Alliance will also assist Maryland DNR in an extensive literature search (especially focused on exotic control issues related to riparian forest buffer establishment) and help implement a Technical Exchange Session with pertinent agency and non-profit professionals and field practitioners. For the guide, case studies will be compiled that showcase various local efforts to control invasives including volunteer roles in such programs. Complementing the production of the guide, a pilot invasive education and control project will be instituted in partnership with the Paxton Creek Watershed Association, Capital Area Greenbelt Association, and Wildwood Lake Nature Center - all based in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania. ACB will facilitate this effort. The initial results and methodologies of this project will be incorporated into the final guide. A one-day workshop based on the guide will also be held. The primary audience will be grassroots practitioners.
- <u>Riparian Forest Buffer Maintenance Guide and Fact Sheets</u> This proposal would 1) hold a workshop to exchange information on successful site preparation and maintenance used in establishing riparian forest buffers, 2) collect field information on buffer survival and noxious and invasive exotic weed occurrence, 3) summarize the state of knowledge in a Guide to Buffer Site Preparation and Maintenance based on the workshops, field data, and literature (paper publication and on internet), and 4) communicate information to landowners through fact sheets and a workshop on common forest buffer maintenance practices.

- Data collection next summer <u>Riparian Forest Buffers Survival and Success in Maryland</u> study (130 locations in 2001; 20 in 2002); what data besides occurrence of noxious or exotic invasive plants in plots would MISC like to see collected? Discussion
 - visual severity rating of invasive species infestation.
 - contact Anne with comments, suggestions.
- Don Robbins Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP) areas existing need/opportunity to start business managing and maintaining CREP areas; need to control noxious weeds.
 - Discussion
 - recipients receive \$7.00/acre for management.
 - CREP properties are overseen on a spot check basis by county Farm Services Administration (FSA) office; guidelines subject to interpretation.
 - management and maintenance needs to be included to ensure quality buffers.

John Peter Thompson

- FEMA money is available to private sector/regulatory agencies for wetland mitigation, native plant restoration in storm drain basins.
