Presentation: <u>Exotic Plants, A Growing Problem</u>, Lisa A. Jameson, National Park Service Capital Region, Exotic Plant Management Team Liaison.

- NPS acreage, 25%+ infested with invasive species.
- Invasive weeds can be a public hazard Texas drowning, caught in weeds.
- Organic Act of 1916 not being upheld Exotic Plant Management Teams (EPMT) formed.
- EPMT Rapid response, highly skilled personnel, deal only with exotics, well equipped 17 teams as of '03, possibly two more in '05.

Steps - 1. Identify, 2. Survey and Map, 3. Control and Eradicate, Restore if necessary. Outreach, Education, and Research.

APCAM, Alien Plant Control and Monitoring database - inventory and monitoring of exotic plants.

Biocontrol - e.g. purple loosestrife - multijurisdictional - MDA, NPS, local park management need to partner on biocontol efforts.

Biocontrol of garlic mustard being considered.

Efforts to gain legislative support - e.g. purple loosestrife.

Invasive exotic plants will not be our future - e.g. Antiedam - Alanthus removal

• Discussion:

How are priorities set? - hierarchy of prioritization, meet with park manager, consider biology, locality, politics, size, probability for success.

Is APCAM available to public? - NPS will supply upon request.

What biocontrol agents are being considered for garlic mustard? Same scientific group as purple loosestrife developing suite of beneficial insects.

How does park maintain control after team leaves? - Teams help park managers develop plan, train park personnel, obtain base funding. Teams will remain in area to provide guidance to parks; follow-up evaluation is being conducted August - November, 2003.

How does program work with existing invasive management plans - Teams will work with and assist existing programs.

Teams size and duration? - no set model; can be seasonal, full time, terms, contractors; varies by location.

Coordinated effort - needed from the start of a project; use MISC as forum for coordination.

Pulling Together Initiative grant proposal; use MISC Web page as venue to post current projects - Carol and Bob Tichenor will meet and set up a template.

Biocontrol program for *Hydrilla* in Virginia - cooperating with Virginia Tech, Army Corps of Engineers.

Rapid containment of monkey pox due to efforts of pest industry; invasions are more likely to come through non-legitimate pet trade channels, i.e. swap meets.

Don Robbins

Giant hogweed - extensive coverage, citizen detections, 11 locations on Little Gunpowder, other detection in Ruxton area north of Baltimore from flower beds (from seed swap); every location is being actively sprayed w/ Round-up.

Carol Holko

Baltimore Sun coverage of MISC and Monthly Invader - spin off from giant hogweed brouhaha. Sudden Oak Death Pest Alert with more emphasis on foliar hosts/symptoms being developed - pre-order printed version through the North Central Pest Management Center, \$50.00/1000, contact Sue Ratcliff, sratclif@uiuc.edu

Virginia Invasive Species Council established in legislation due to efforts of UR students.

Other updates

Emerald ash borer, confined to Michigan, changing the landscape where established.

Pryeria - 10 square miles infested in Glen Burnie area; MDA will evaluate next year; should be easy to control.
