Update on Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) in Maryland - Dick Bean

- all outplanted ash that we could find have been removed, 159 trees at 51 sites
- almost all ash have been removed within ½ mile buffer zone around infested nursery over 1000 trees removed on @500 acres; cooperation between MDA, PEPCO, PG Co. Health Dept., DNR, others
- will put out sentinel trees to trap adult EAB, wrap trunks with plastic wrap and Tanglefoot; 60 around nursery, others at two outplanted sites
- stumps treated by MDA Weed Control personnel with Garlon 3

Update on Sudden Oak Death (SOD) - Bob Rabaglia, Carol Holko

- pathogen *Phytophthora ramorum* identified in 2000 as causal agent in oak mortality in northern California, a.k.a. sudden oak death, ramorum blight
- since then has been confirmed in nurseries and nature in California and Oregon, and nurseries in Washington State
- In March, 2004 confirmed in two southern California nurseries, Monrovia, Azusa, and Specialty Plants, Inc. in San Diego County
- Suspect host plants shipped from Monrovia to many states including 10 nurseries in Maryland

- Suspect bonsai camellias shipped to over 200 individuals in Maryland
- Other states have issued quarantines against California and others, with varying degrees of restrictions; USDA is taking action that will supercede all state quarantines

- Discussion

Kerrie Kyde (with ARS SOD team) – host range testing: rhododendrons highly susceptible, azalea less so, mountain laurel worse than anything else; stem and foliar testing: stem – chestnut and white oaks most susceptible, foliar – Chestnut oak more, red oak less

Use other states (eg. EAB in Michigan, SOD in Oregon) as models for action? Environmental conditions? All infestations in OR and CA are coastal; cool, wet preferred by pathogen

Spirited debate on what action should be taken in Maryland, whether nursery stock should be presumed innocent or guilty, potential implications for Maryland forests, nurseries ...

<u>Legislative Update</u> – Holko, McKnight

- SB151 killed in committee
- HB 1100 withdrawn; DNR will work with sponsor on crafting meaningful legislation relative to sustainable landscaping, backyard wildlife habitat
- Unusual activity on Noxious Weed Law in 2004 session, none passed but may indicate piqued interest in invasive species

Update on Mute Swans - Jonathan McKnight

- 2004 mute swan permit refused by Federal government based on 2003 ruling
- Migratory Bird Treaty Reform Act (H.R.4114) in Congress would remove all introduced species (86 species including mute swan) - sponsored by Wayne Gilchrest; to support, write Congress; Jonathan will distribute letter of support to MISC list serve; Bob Tichenor will sign for MISC if okay.
- Anecdotal indications of significant winter mortality no action can be taken in 2004 to prevent reproduction, @3600 last fall.

Motion to find a resolution to support proposed H.R.4114 as proposed by Gilchrest. Motion seconded and passed.

• Blackwater Wildlife Refuge essentially nutria-free – natural wetland regeneration faster than expected.

Brochure/Invasives list - Carol Holko

Out of brochures, need to reprint; additions, deletions, changes?
 Add Ralstonia solanacearum, race 3 biovar 2, Southern bacterial wilt Mosquito fish should stay on - G. holbrooki is the native species; change G. affinis to "Western" mosquito fish; Ruth Hanessian would like to know where to purchase G. holbrooki

Sara Tangren - propose to add Sericea Lespedeza, *L. cuneata*; Eric Duce - SHA opposes because: 1) useful on highly erodible slopes, 2) legume benefits, 2) has not been invasive; Would change opinion if shown publishable research, peer-reviewed literature, and/or anecdotal info. Discussion - Innocent until until proven guilty? Should SHA take responsibility? SHA follows up on complaints; Sara, Jonathan McKnight will follow up with SHA, Sylvan will distribute material.

Sawtooth oak? DNR would oppose adding to list,
