- National Plant Board meeting August 7-11 gave noxious weed update
- Noxious Weed Control and Eradication Act no 2006 APHIS funding for matching grant program to date; use Plant Board regions as evaluation sites for weed management entities concerns with tribal properties

PTI grant for purple loosestrife - Kerrie Kyde

- MISC is a \$9000 match
- recruit and train volunteers to recognize plant and report sitings MDA, SHA, DNR will ground truth and evaluate treatment options
- contact Kerrie with sitings
- Two other PTI grants in Maryland Ft. Meade and Patuxent, Baltimore Parks

MDA

Dick Bean

Plum pox virus survey - backyard Prunus survey, all negative,

Emerald ash borer survey - all negative, EAB research review meeting inSeptember

- Lost Coast Firewood shipped material from quarantine area, trace forwards ongoing
- Imported fire ant six positive sites, 3 from last year, 3 new sites; treatments difficult in resorts, Tiki bars

Brown marmorated sting bug - 24 experimental traps from Steve Bullington to be placed in MD *Vibernum* leaf beetle movement

#### Lane Heimer

Giant hogweed - new infestations in Mountain Lake Park, Garrett County; local press coverage

- helped to locate infestations
- sites include private property, day care, school, rights-of-way
- probable skin burns on homeowners
- Round-up not always effective, use Garlon
- all sites treated minor resistance from one homeowner

#### Carol Holko

Niger seed - Marginal crop imported from India, federal regulations require heat treatment to prevent introduction of viable noxious weed seed; 3 heat treatment facilities, MD, NJ, Singapore; quality assurance requires regular germination testing - tetrazolium chloride testing will now be required for 24-hour turnaround to minimize chance of viable weed seed being distributed

Potato Wart - ongoing U. S. trade negotiations to ship chipping potatoes to Japan held up by golden nematode in NY and potato wart (fungal pathogen) in MD:

1921 - state Quarantine in Allegheny County

1986 - survey; non-viable spores detected

1987-1992 - field assays yielded no warted potatoes

Soybean rust - still watching, possible recent spore trap detection in VA

*P. ramorum* - slow, weird year, surveys ongoing, no new positives in Maryland

Alternanthera sessilis - on federal noxious weed list, Maryland had two events; can petition to take something off the list; original species listed by committee - no records available

Jonathan McKnight

\$720,000 grant - Maryland Landowner Incentive Program for management work on private lands for conservation of species at risk - invasive species component; posted on DNR Website, <u>http://www.dnr.state.md.us/wildlife/lip.asp</u>; 25% match can be in-kind services, etc.

#### Kerrie Kyde

Forest Pest Management Team project is underway - prioritize treatment needs, monitor results *Caulerpa* Draft Management Plan - comments due September 16

Snakehead fish in @16 miles of the Potomac River, mostly on the VA side; juveniles up to 6-yearolds; fewer captured on MD side; anglers are most effective management tool; shipments intercepted from Thailand, marked as "bass"
